EMERGENCY REGULATION NO. 2016/17 S-16

Quinault Tribal Law Enforcement

DATE: October 24, 2016
SUBJECT: Off-Reservation, Subsistence Harvest of **Roosevelt Beach** Razor Clams

The Off-reservation area between Joe Creek and the Copalis River will be open to subsistence harvests of razor clams on the following dates:

(Note: **No harvesting is allowed north of Joe Creek on the Moclips/Pacific Beach Area.**)

Latest test results indicate current biotoxin levels are within health guidelines.

All diggers shall enter and leave the beach using the beach access at Roosevelt Beach Road located off State Highway 109 at milepost 26.1.

The daily limit is 100 razor clams per person. ***Digging for dependants is allowed only if dependant(s) are present at the beach within eyesight of designated tribal harvester(s).***

All clams dug will be for personal use only. **No commercial sales.**


Digging is limited to two hours prior to book-low tide and is terminated one hour after book-low tide.


All clams dug shall be retained. Small or broken clams shall not be returned to the beach once harvested.

All provisions of the Quinault Tribal Code, Title 51, will be in effect.

This regulation only applies to enrolled members of the Quinault Indian Nation who will participate in the clam fishery. All clam diggers will be required to show Quinault identification.

This regulation may be rescinded based on further clam biotoxin testing.
